REPORT OF THE COOPERATION ACTIVITIES IN 2024-2025

The following cooperation activities were adopted at the 17th EAPVP Forum Meeting which was held in Phnom Penh, Kingdom of Cambodia on 27 August 2024.

- 01. Dissemination Workshop on Law enforcement on Seed Management and Plant Breeder's Right conform with the Act.1991 of UPOV Convention (proposed by Cambodia)
- 02. Translation and publishing the DUS examination on major crops and development of harmonization description of new variety of plants in Cambodia language (proposed by Cambodia)
- 03. Technical consultation meeting on Amendment of the Law on Seed Management and Plant Breeder's Right conform with the Act.1991 of UPOV Convention (proposed by Cambodia)
- 04. Establish a database and gathering the DUS testing guidelines of new plant Variety protection (proposed by Lao PDR)
- 05. Raising awareness of Laos's PVP, update on legislation and introduction of e-PVP Asia (proposed by Lao PDR)
- 06. Training on PVP administration, DUS examination for mulberry, rice and corn (proposed by Lao PDR)
- 07. Regional Cooperation on Test Guidelines Development Workshop for Black Pepper (Piper nigrum) Project 1 (proposed by Malaysia)
- 08. Awareness Raising Workshop on UPOV PVP System among the relevant policy makers and stakeholders with the assistance of the experts from UPOV and EAPVP forum members (proposed by Myanmar)

- 2. Support for Translation and Printing of UPOV TGs for Pineapple, Black Radish (proposed by Cambodia)
- 3. Test Guidelines Development Workshop for Black Pepper (Piper nigrum) Project 1 (proposed by Malaysia)

Through investigation for existing Black Pepper TGs, TGs were gathered from several countries, and preparations are underway for the next steps

4. e-PVP Regional Meeting (Asia)

ACCESSION: By or before August 2026

- BruIPO and DOAA is focusing on building awareness of the system with potential breeders and farmers so
 that locals can benefit from the system rather than just benefiting foreign companies and nationals

3- Challenges and Countermeasures

- There is no clear coordination mechanism or legal clarity on which ministry leads on PVP (Plant Variety Protection) under UPOV.
- 2. UPOV 1991 requires stronger exclusive breeder's rights, including:
- Protection of harvested material and essentially derived varieties (EDVs)
- Stronger enforcement measures and
- Cambodia's current law provides exceptions for small farmers and less enforcement power, creating legal inconsistencies.

3- Challenges and Countermeasures

- 3- Inter-ministerial Coordination Breakdown: 4–5 rounds of meeting discussion have not reached consensus due to:
- Different priorities (MAFF: farmer protection; MISTI: innovation/IPR),
- · Lack of trust and joint ownership,
- · No third-party arbitrator or high-level directive.

3- Challenges and Countermeasures

- 4. Capacity Gaps and Understanding of UPOV 1991
- Technical understanding of UPOV 1991's full implications is not uniform across ministries.
- Concerns about impact on farmers' rights, local variety use, and breeding innovation from public institutions (e.g., CARDI).
- 5. Stakeholder Concerns and Political Sensitivity
- Local breeders and NGOs express concerns that UPOV 1991 will limit farmers' seed-saving rights.
- Political caution exists around appearing to favor multinational breeders or reduce national seed sovereignty.

4- How to address the challenges

- A. Establish a High-Level Inter-Ministerial Taskforce
- Formally mandated by the Prime Minister's Office or the Council of Ministers.
- Include MAFF, MISTI, MoC (Commerce), Ministry of Justice, and legal advisors
- Develop a Joint Implementation Roadmap.
- B. Develop a Unified Legal Framework or Dual Decree Model
- Option 1: Create a single amended law with clear division of roles (e.g., MAFF handles seed management; MISTI handles breeder rights/IP).
- Option 2: Issue two complementary legal instruments:
- A Seed Management Law under MAFF
- A Plant Breeder's Right Law under MISTI (linked to IP framework)


Recent Developments in PVP

- 3. Review by the Ministry of Law and Human Rights in 2022, lead to recommendations for legal amendments.
- 4. Established cooperation with IPKEY <u>South East</u> Asia conducting Seminar on PVP and UPOV 1991 act in 2023
- 5. The amendment to Law No. 29 of 2000 has been proposed by Commission IV of the House of Representatives to be included as a medium-term priority for the 2025-2029 period.
